Velma Teague Library Relocation FAQ



The Velma Teague Library will be getting a \$7.9 million upgrade and moving to a new location at the Promenade at Palmaire! The new location will be just one block north of the existing facility.

Our goal is to provide the Velma Teague community with access to the best technology, equipment, and amenities available in our library system. The legacy and history of the Velma Teague Library will be both honored and elevated in this process.

We expect that the new Velma Teague Library will be completed by the first quarter of 2026.

Why does Velma Teague need to move?

The building is in extremely poor condition and needs a little more than \$5 million just to remediate problems (would not include new amenities). For those of you who visit regularly, you know that our Community Room must rely on portable air conditioning units to cool the space as does our server room. The roof needs to be replaced along with the entire electrical system and controls, lighting, plumbing, and bathrooms. Because the building was constructed in the late 60's/early 70's, asbestos building materials were used in the construction. While the building is safe to occupy, we cannot make any changes to the building without a comprehensive asbestos remediation.

Couldn't we just address the problems at Velma Teague so it could stay where it is at?

Yes, we could. However, the design of the building does not meet modern library design standards and our ability to deliver additional amenities like more programming/meeting rooms and quiet rooms for patrons would be extremely limited. We want Velma Teague patrons to have the best library in the system. To do that at the existing building would require bond funding which we do not currently have, and the project would not take place for approximately 3-5 years. The estimated cost for that project in the future is a little over \$17 million.

But isn't Velma Teague a historical building?

No. The building opened in 1971 and was the third library building that Glendale had. The branch was named the Velma Teague Library when it opened in honor of the city's long-time head librarian who had passed away two years before the project was complete. What is historical is the legacy of our library system, how it began, and the nostalgia associated with Velma Teague's advocacy for expanding the library to what it is today. The legacy and history of the Velma Teague Library will be both honored and elevated in this process at the new location as well as in Murphy Park.



Hasn't the library always been in Murphy Park?

Actually, the first Glendale library collection began at a lumberyard managed by Victor E. Messinger, who moved to Glendale in 1895 with a collection of nearly 400 books. As the community's interest grew, more materials were donated, leading to the library's relocation to Glendale and 58th Drive, where Messinger served as a part-time librarian. In 1898, a formal library association was formed, though the library moved between various locations until settling in Murphy Park in 1917. A 2,200 sq. ft. Spanish-style building was built in 1938, and in 1971, Velma Teague advocated for the new 15,500 sq. ft. facility, which served the community until 1987 when the Main Library was constructed.

Where will the new Velma Teague Library be located?

5835 W. Palmaire Avenue, just one block north of the existing library. It is a little more than 800 feet door-to-door from the existing building.

Where will visitors park?

The new location is attached to a parking garage to provide convenient covered parking and easy access to the library. There is also on-street parking surrounding the building.

What new amenities are expected at the new facility?

Based on the feedback we have received from patrons, we expect to incorporate art exhibits, a maker space, meeting and gathering space, and a "library of things" for checkout in the overall design along with our collection and ample seating space. The new facility also has a large outdoor patio space that will remain in the new design.

When will the new facility open?

The timeline is still being fully developed, but the facility is expected to open in the first quarter of 2026 around the same time the new City Hall, amphitheater, and Murphy Park are opened.

Will the library have to be closed for any period of time?

Yes. We expect to need to close the library for approximately 4-6 months to allow reconstruction of Murphy Park. We will be developing a continuity of operations plan to minimize impacts to Velma Teague patrons by providing programming and hold pick-ups at nearby locations to the degree possible. We will provide more information as those plans are developed.

What is going to happen with Murphy Park?

This project includes an additional \$1.5 million investment to return the former library location back into a park amenity. There is not currently a design for what the park will look like, but there are no plans to make it anything other than a park. There will be additional communication from the city as the design process for Murphy Park begins.
